Holy Habit #3: Worship

The cupboard is crammed with leftover Christmas cake, the floor is carpeted with tree needles, and you're crashed out on the sofa, wondering how soon it's socially acceptable to throw away your neighbours' Christmas cards. January can feel like a month of recovery as we regain normality and shut the last decorations in the loft for another year. After the Christmas fizz, it can feel quiet and empty. We'll be taking advantage of January's quietness by exploring our next holy habit: worship.



Worship is the heartbeat of the church. It's what humanity, and all creation, was created for. When we worship, we become more and more who we were made to be – and we find that things that were troubling us, things we've been stuck on, begin to change. Worship is not just singing hymns or chanting liturgy. Worship is showing God that we love him and want to honour him, and we can do that a hundred different ways, in our day to day life as well as when we gather together.

This January and February are an opportunity for us to make worship our priority. To explore new ways of worshipping. To ingrain the habit of worshipping God every day. You'd be surprised what a difference this can make in your life! Here are some ways you can practise this holy habit:

- Each week, there will be a different suggestion in the pew sheet for us to try out at home.
- Join us on 25th January and 22nd February for **Come and Sing**, where we'll worship God together with new songs and old favourites (St Minver church, 5 pm).
- Calling all musicians! On 1st February we're holding a worship music training day for all who play instruments or sing and are interested in learning more about playing in worship bands. We'll be thinking about why/how we use music to worship and learning practical tips. Bring your instrument to come and have a go, with no obligation to sign up to any rotas! All ages welcome. Bring and share lunch. (Perceval Institute, 9.45 – 3 pm).
- Join one of our **home groups** to explore with others what worship means.

What is a home group?

There are 2 home groups running in the cluster at the moment, which meet on Tuesdays at 7pm.

The St Minver group is a place where in the words of current members "we can be serious and not take ourselves too seriously", "a place where we can laugh and cry", "a place of safety where we can grow in our faith". We worship and study together (the bible and study guides), pray together, support one another, and share meals. Each session lasts about 2 hours, starting with coffee or tea (and maybe a brownie or shortbread).

The Polzeath group meets for coffee and snacks at 7pm. At 7.30 we start a bible study and share our thoughts until 9pm. It is a very fluid fellowship group to which all are invited, even if you are not a regular churchgoer. There is no commitment required. We just like it to be a place where people can explore what Christianity is, and how it might relate to their lives. We welcome all travelers on the journey!

Both groups have been looking at the book of Acts and seeing how the early church lived out their faith. This had tied in well with the Holy Habits we are practicing in church. "Time, like an ever-rolling stream, bears all its sons away"

That line is from "Our God, our help in ages past", written by Isaac Watts in 1708. It paraphrases Psalm 90, which was written a millennia ago. It seems that over 300 years ago, people then felt the speed at which life seems to sweep us along. So the feeling for some of us of a certain age, that there are at least two Christmases a year and probably more, is not to be wondered at. Think about it – a fifth of the 21st century has already gone! Yet when we were in our teens, life could drag terribly, when we wanted to get on with life, to succeed, and to achieve. Those of us of that certain age had to cope with National Service, two years largely wasted, feeling like ten.

By the time this is read, life might be rather different, perhaps very different. For did we not have a General Election before Christmas? And the associated dilemma, which I refuse to mention, might have been settled, perhaps? Or not? Exciting, if not something of a black cloud which hung over us at a time when we prepared to celebrate with our families and friends.

The real meaning of Christmas is often lost beneath the rush to buy food, presents, decorations, and, oh yes, the winter ski-ing holidays coming soon afterwards. Then there are the appeals to help those without - without a roof over their heads and even a friend to pray for them. Schools, at least the primary schools, celebrate, and the Nativity play is enjoyed by children and parents alike.

Christmas, the Nativity, was the greatest event in history. If God had not come to live as a human being, born to Mary in Bethlehem, there would be no Christian faith, at least as we know it, whatever else might have happened. No Christmas, no Easter, no Church – it's as simple as that. Jesus was conceived spiritually, in a way we cannot understand, but he grew to become a wandering teacher who performed deeds which were impossible. That is why we call them miracles. Yet he was born to a human mother, which made him as human as we are.

His short ministry of teaching has given our lives values to aspire to and be guided by. In particular at this time we need to remember that Jesus, although a Jew, welcomed and healed people of all races, such as the servant of a Roman centurion, the son of the Syrian woman, the epileptic of Gedara, the woman of Samaria, the Greeks who sought him, as well as the people of Lebanon and east of Israel.

So while all of us in the North Cornwall group of churches wish that your Christmas was happy, please spare time to dwell on the real importance and meaning of the Nativity in our lives and the lives of those we love. May God be with us as we enter 2020. Peter Coster

We like cartoons in our family and currently "Steven Universe" is our favourite. It is about a boy who is brought up by three women aliens each with a gem that brings them specific skills, talents and shortfalls.

Pearl's gem is located on her forehead, making her logical, analytical, and thoughtful and knowledge is very important to her. She worries the most about Steven and is quick to abandon the mission to keep him safe.

Amethyst's gem is on her chest, she is quick to feel things, impulsive to act and finds it difficult to reign in her temper and emotions. Amethyst plays the most with Steven and will entertain all his ideas however wild and wacky they may be.

Garnet is the leader of the group with gems on her hands; she is always ready to take decisive action and prepared to try something new if it will get things moving. Garnet is a reassuring strength to Steven; she believes in him and gives him the courage to believe in himself.

Steven has a human Dad and Gem Mum. His mother died giving birth to him but he has her gem and like her, his gem is on his belly button. He is a very protective, caring and self giving person. Steven's gut instinct sees the goodness in the broken gems and desires to forgive, heel and restore them.

I wonder if just as Steven experiences the love from the gems differently then maybe we each might experience the Love of God differently too and so I suppose our responses to that love may be quite different; what works well as worship for one person will not necessarily work so well for me.

We are not called to live in bubbles though nor are we one-dimensional characters and neither should our worship be. In Mark 12;28-31 Jesus said that the greatest commandment is to "Love the Lord your God with all your heart, soul, mind and strength"
