Sharing in Worship

As we come to the end of what has been a very strange summer, there is lots to look forwards to. We are beginning a new Holy Habit: Sharing Resources. And in the life of our churches, we are also sharing in worship more than ever – in person as well as online.

When we began to hold public worship again, we did not know who would come or how it would go. We worked hard to make the experience of coming to church as safe as possible. And we did our best to offer worship that was as rich as possible, in spite of all the restrictions. People who came told us that they enjoyed being with people from the other churches in the Cluster. As there was only one service we were more united than ever.

But worshipping together is also costly and uncomfortable. Because our usual styles of worship are very different across the 6 churches and online, the worship we share is bound to have aspects which are more or less familiar to us. When this is added to the strangeness of face coverings and social distancing, it can be a challenge to stay focussed on worshipping God.

But these challenges are all part of what enables us to have a mature faith, and they can be real opportunities for growth. Just as so many people found that the challenge of lockdown enabled them to grow in their relationship with God and prayer life, so the challenge of sharing in worship with one another can also be a chance to grow spiritually. After all, Jesus is always calling his disciples out of their comfort zones – it is only to be expected that Jesus will call us to grow as disciples as well.

In the recent services there have been moments which I would never have expected, moments of sheer joy and a sense of deep connection to the one who has made us all and loves us completely. I thank God for all the hard work and inspiration, prayer and patience which has enabled us to share in worship so far.

Looking ahead, we will continue to share in worship as we increase the number of services across the Cluster. This will be a time when we are still needing to think of one another before ourselves, as we seek to find ways of sharing in worship that enable people from across the Cluster to come together. But gradually as we build up our capacity we hope to be able to get to a point later in the autumn where all of our churches can hold familiar services.

I pray that we will all find new ways of growing during this time: growing in patience and humility; growing in mutual understanding and care; and growing in faith and love.

Sharing resources

I expect by now we are all familiar with the Acts passage. This holy habit focuses on the phrase 'All the believers were together and had everything in common; they would sell their possessions and goods and distribute the proceeds to all, as any had need' (Acts 2 v 44)

This has become a much more difficult topic with all the limitations surrounding Covid. We are unable to meet face to face, unable to visit, and cannot connect in our groups as before. Much of 21st century western culture encourages us to live separate, independent lives protecting our individuality, our privacy and our belongings. Covid has separated us even more and it is a challenge to still demonstrate and practice this holy habit. We are hoping to explore what having all things in common and providing for those in need could look like personally and collectively in holy living.

It is not just about offering others what you can spare. Nor is it about taking what you fancy. To share something means changing our relationship with that item. Sharing roles and gifts may mean accepting that a task is not completed as we would like it to be. Sharing ideas and thoughts can make us vulnerable. True sharing is about working together in an open, honest and thoughtful manner without any agendas. It can be costly and demanding, but an amazing transformational experience. Jesus came to earth to share everything with us. It was not just that he could do miracles, was the Son of God and gave us His teachings. He came to earth to share his humanity and spirituality. This is our biggest challenge

To this end we will divide the habit into 2 sections. In September we will focus on 'Share and share alike'. In October we will look at 'Sharing responsibility'. Our hope and prayer is that as well as being challenged you will be encouraged in this Holy Habit. Blessings to you all.
